THIRD YEAR REQUIRED CLASSES

Satisfactory Completion of the Required Units. A minimum of eighty-seven (87) units must be completed with a passing grade. At least fifty-eight (58) units must be completed at Loyola, keeping within the maximum number of units permitted for pass/fail elections, externships, and directed research.

Academic Good Standing. In order to be in academic good standing and eligible for graduation, a student must have a weighted cumulative grade point average of 2.00 or above. If a student completes eighty-seven (87) units and does not have this average, the student is governed by the appropriate Rules on Disqualification and Probation.

Breadth Requirement. The breadth requirement may be met by taking any of a number of courses in the areas of Jurisprudence, Legal History or Comparative Law. Each year, the Registrar will list the courses being offered which may satisfy the breadth requirement. Reference should also be made to the section on Breadth and Upper Division Writing Requirement Courses for a list of courses that may satisfy this requirement. The breadth requirement may not be satisfied through a directed research project.

Pro Bono Requirement. In October, 1992, the faculty of Loyola Law School instituted a pro bono graduation requirement. The purpose of the requirement is to expose students to their professional ethical obligation to perform public service work. This is consistent with a lawyer's professional responsibility to provide legal assistance to those persons unable to afford traditional legal representation.

Upper Division Writing Requirement. This requirement may be fulfilled at any time after completion of the first year day or evening. In order to fulfill the requirement, the student must complete a two-unit research paper or papers, as specifically set forth in the Student Handbooks.
